Re: Request for Records: BCLC File 21-016

British Columbia Lottery Corporation (BCLC) writes further to your May 14, 2021 request under B.C.'s *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (FIPPA) and BCLC's letter of same date.

You requested:

"I have a few requests for data. I've copied these requests below. I also have prepared a spreadsheet which provided date ranges and example outputs...

- Request 1 (Menus/Game Results)
 - 1. All the Toto menus as noted on the "Menus Requested" tab
 - 2. All requested Toto menus in the format specified on "Toto Format (Requested)" tab
 - a. The key data attributes are noted in the column headers
- Request 2 (Systems)
 - 1. For each Toto menu requested, please provide a breakdown of each ticket purchased by system and/or cost
 - 2. I've provided an example format on the "Systems" tab
- Request 3 (Prizes)
 - 1. For each Toto menu requested, please provide a list of the Prizes
- Request 4 (Winners) 1. For
 - For each Toto menu requested, please provide a breakdown of all Prizes by System type"

Following BCLC's letter, on May 14, 2021, you further provided BCLC with the spreadsheet you refer to in your request wording.

Regarding parts one, three and four of your request, the information you have requested is publicly available to view, study or copy at the following link: <u>https://lotto.bclc.com/sports-action/results.html.</u>

Regarding part two of your request, BCLC has no business purpose to generate or maintain records in the manner you have requested and therefore has no responsive records. BCLC has examined the possibility of creating the record and concluded that it is not obligated to do so under section 6(2) of FIPPA, which states:

"...the head of a public body must create a records for an applicant if

(a) the record can be created from a machine readable record in the custody or under the control of the public body using its normal computer hardware or software and technical expertise, and

(b) creating the records would not unreasonably interfere with the operations of the public body."

Creating the requested records would unreasonably interfere with BCLC's operations. This is because:

- BCLC would need to conduct significant manual data operations to compile the information into the new record;
- the manual data operations to create the new record would necessitate further review for data integrity, potential errors and omissions; and
- creating the new record would require numerous hours, considerable resources, and result in a significant
 opportunity cost to BCLC.
