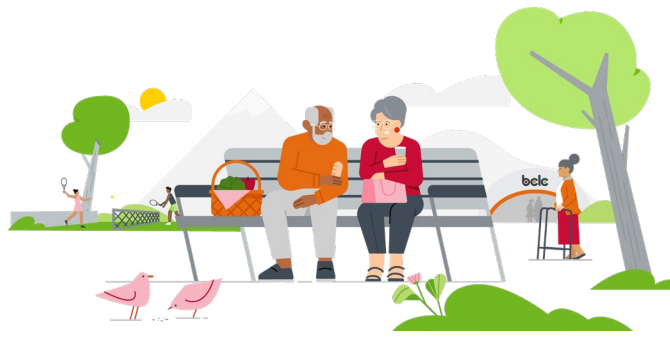
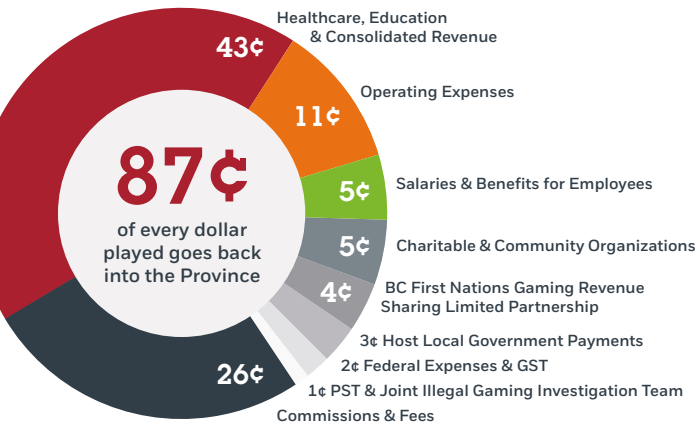

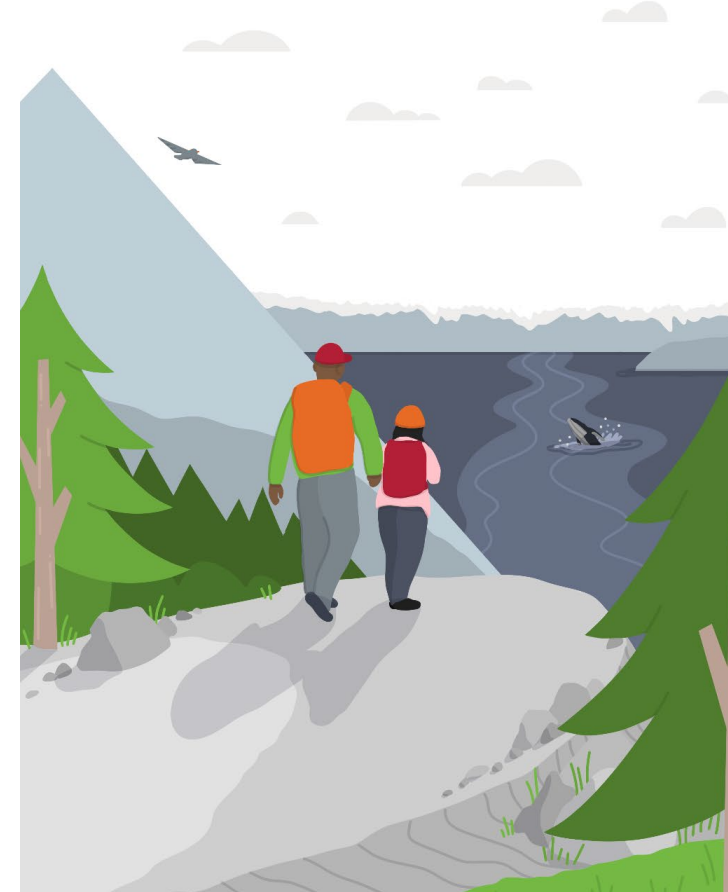
DID YOU KNOW?

Each year, municipal and First Nation governments in B.C. that host a gambling facility receive a 10 per cent share of net gambling income generated at those facilities. Last year, 33 Host Local Governments across B.C. received **\$100.8 million** in provincial gambling revenue to fund local projects and initiatives.

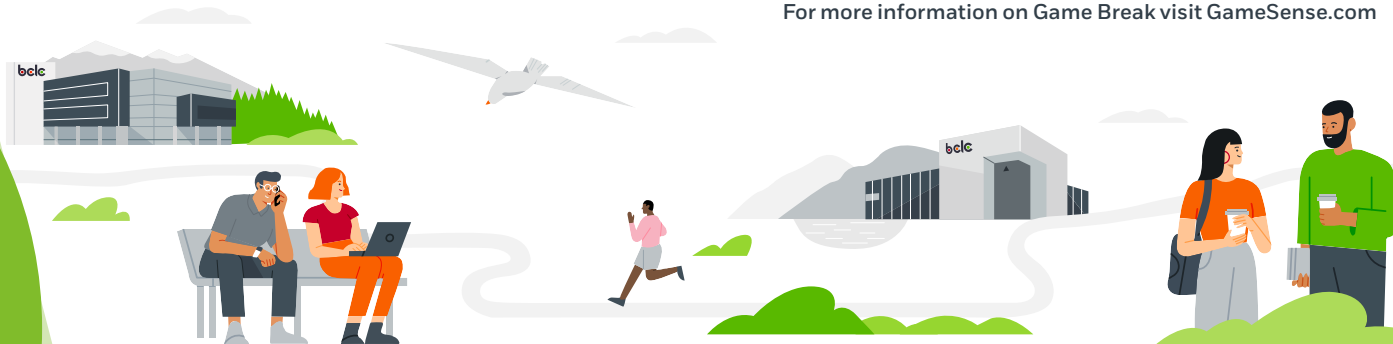

In November 2022, 20 team members from Chances Campbell River participated in the Movember challenge and grew a moustache for the month of November. On their behalf, Gateway Casinos & Entertainment donated \$3,000 to Movember to support men's health and suicide prevention.



GENERATING WIN-WINS

IN CAMPBELL RIVER

In 2022, the City of Campbell River allocated its share of provincial gambling revenue from hosting Chances Campbell River to a variety of community programs.

\$80,000 supported CR Live Streets (6 major family events/concerts) along with other downtown activations such as; 'A Night Out Downtown,' a celebration of the city's downtown business district, where visitors enjoyed music, live comedy, food, and special discounts. Attendees were encouraged to pick up a passport which they could then have stamped by various merchants to earn entries for prizes.

Additional funds supported initiatives such as warming shelters, Q'walyu House and the Wounded Warrior Run. Funding also went to Wild Wise Campbell River in an effort to reduce human-wildlife conflicts in the area.

PLAYER HEALTH

GAME BREAK



It's important to take breaks when gambling. It's a way to pause and regain perspective. However, when it becomes harder to fit in breaks and gambling just doesn't seem fun anymore, BCLC's Game Break program can be the first step towards getting help.

In January 2023, BCLC launched Game Break, a reconceptualized self-exclusion program with an active reinstatement process that strives to reduce stigma and empower individuals to make the right choices for themselves.

When a Game Break term is completed, individuals take part in an online program that encourages self-reflection and awareness before they return to gambling, if they choose to at all. If they are not ready, they have the option to extend their break.
