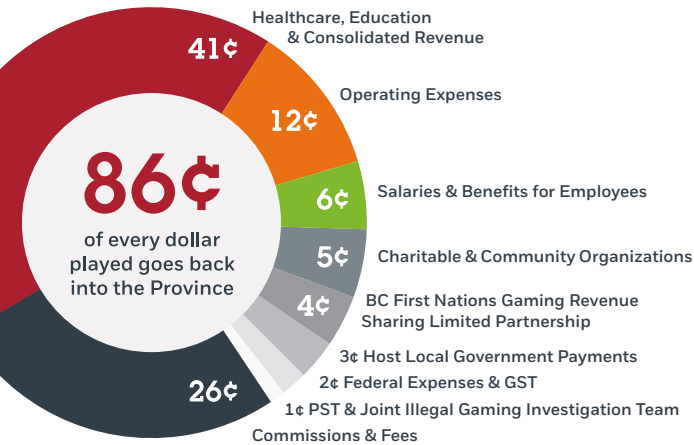

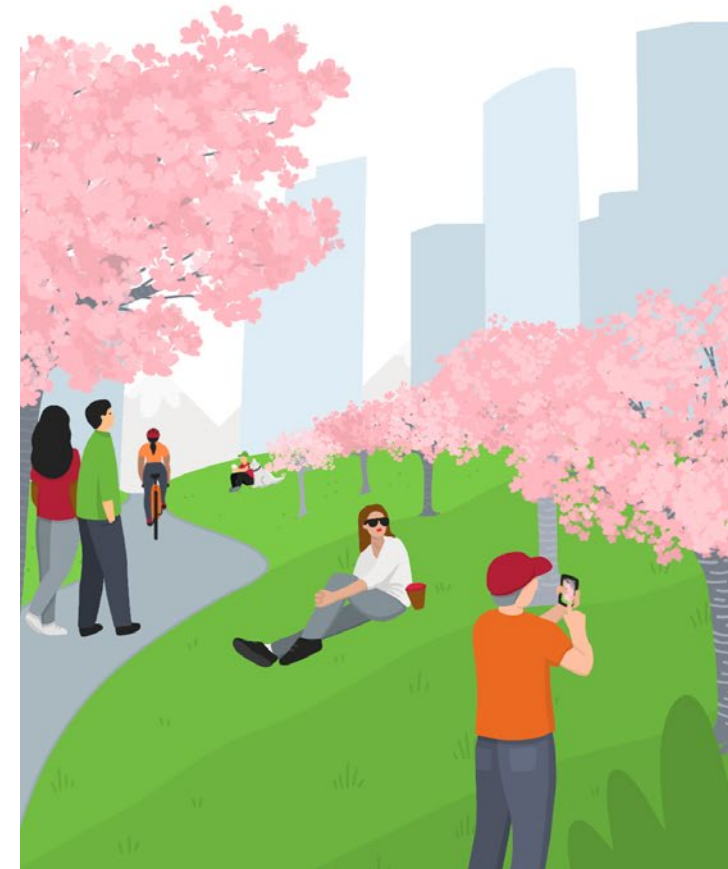

Each year, municipal and First Nations governments in B.C. that host a gambling facility typically receive a 10 per cent share of net gambling income generated at those facilities. In fiscal year 2023/24, BCLC generated \$94.5 million for the Province to distribute to 33 Host Local Governments across B.C. to fund local projects and initiatives.

SURREY FOOD BANK

In 2023, Elements Casino Surrey supported the community through donations to more than a dozen local organizations, including the Surrey Food Bank, Surrey Women's Shelter Society, and Cloverdale Community Kitchen. Elements Casino team members also lent a helping hand in their community by hosting various fundraisers including barbecues, car washes, and "dress up" days. They volunteered their time in various ways, giving blood, preparing and serving meals, and sorting and packing donations at the Surrey Food Bank.

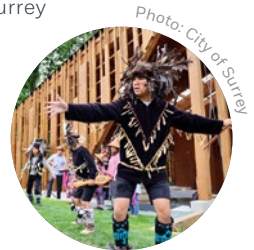

SURREY BENEFITS

In 2023, the City of Surrey allocated a portion of its provincial gambling revenue from hosting Elements Casino Surrey to finance several major capital improvement projects. Among these is the construction of the new Bear Creek Stadium, set to replace the existing track at Bear Creek Park. This new facility, expected to be complete in late 2024, will meet international standards and support a full range of track and field sports. It features a partially covered grandstand with permanent seating for 2,200 spectators, seamlessly integrated into the park's existing layout.

Additionally, the gambling revenues funded Totest Aleng – Surrey's Indigenous Learning House, located in Elgin Heritage Park. This space for connection, gathering, and learning is situated on the unceded traditional lands of the Salish peoples including the ḱíçəy̓ (Katzie), ḱw̓ɑ:nl̓ən (Kwantlen), and se'mya'me (Semiahmoo). Created in consultation with representatives from these nations, the site includes a designated studio to support artistic practices and artists in residence. Totest Aleng aims to become an Indigenous cultural hub for activities such as carving, beading, cedar weaving, artist talks, and storytelling.

The City of Surrey also used gambling revenue to replace an artificial turf field at South Surrey Athletic Park, enhancing the quality and safety of the sports facilities available to residents.

LOCAL IMPACT

Elements Casino Surrey supports the local economy by working with more than 50 local vendors such as Tornado Building Maintenance, Peninsula Wall & Ceiling, and Southridge Building Supplies.
