DRAGON BOAT FESTIVAL

BCLC proudly sponsors the Concord Pacific Dragon Boat Festival, a vibrant event featuring dragon boat racing, live music, and other entertainment. The festival's venue spans the eastern tip of False Creek, from Concord Pacific Place to Creekside Park by Science World, with excellent vantage points for watching the races around Vancouver's Olympic Village on the south side of the water. The Vancouver Dragon Boat Festival typically includes outdoor music and dance performances, a beer garden, food vendors, and a marketplace, along with plenty of dragon boat racing in the waters of False Creek.

VANCOUVER BENEFITS

In 2023, the City of Vancouver allocated the majority of its provincial gambling revenue from hosting Parq Vancouver and Hastings Racecourse to public safety services and citywide services, including community services, parks and recreation.

Funding supported community services by supporting, elevating and celebrating the arts and cultural fabric of the city by enabling creative and artistic impact through people, projects and organizations, with emphasis on x*ma θ k*ay`am (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish) and səlilwəta θ t (Tsleil-Waututh) First Nations visibility and voice on the land across the city.

The Vancouver Fire and Rescue Services (VFRS) received support for a multi-year growth plan to address rising risks in Vancouver, including the increasing frequency and severity of fires. The plan also includes initiatives for effective community outreach, public education in a diverse city, and addressing the overdose crisis. Additionally, the Vancouver Public Library received funding to improve accessibility for people with disabilities, enhancing both physical and digital touchpoints across the system.

DID YOU KNOW? LOCAL IMPACT

Parq Vancouver supports the local economy by working with many local vendors Trimpac Sysco Fine Meats, Jim M Koo Produce, and Chasers Juice. In 2023, Parq Vancouver gave back to the community through donations to its community partners: YWCA Metro Vancouver, Vancouver Chinatown Foundation, Downtown Eastside Women's Centre, and the St. Paul's Foundation.

Hastings Racecourse hosts 10 Community Days each year, committing \$65,000 in support through cash donations and hosting fundraisers. The 2023 Community Days recipients included the Downtown Eastside Neighbourhood House, EMBERS, Employ to Empower, Firehall Theatre Society, Greater Vancouver Food Bank, SHARE, and many others. Hastings Racecourse also contributes \$500,000 annually to the City of Vancouver's Hastings Park Improvement Fund.
