# Adams Lake Indian Band Benefits

The Province of B.C. created BCLC 40 years ago with the purpose of giving back to British Columbians and to help communities grow. Since that time, thanks to our players, BCLC has delivered \$30 billion in net income back to the province to support communities, provincial programs and essential services that we all rely on.

First Nations receive a seven percent entitlement of BCLC net income through the BC First Nations Gaming Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership.

Since 2015, the Adams Lake Indian Band has received more than \$4.8 million in Host Local Government payments. Last year, the Adams Lake Indian Band received \$565,761 generated by Chances Salmon Arm to fund local

initiatives in the community.

As part of BCLC's Commitment to Reconciliation, the cover artwork of this Community Impact Report was created by Kel-c Jules, a Secwépemc artist residing on the traditional, unceded lands of Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc. Her focuses include residential school awareness, Secwépemc culture, and nature and pictographs found in the surrounding area. Her work connects and builds a bridge between two worlds, working to show how we are all woven together as one.

The cover art depicts Yúcwe, the waterfall at Chase Creek Falls, that flows through Secwépemc'ulucw, carrying stories, medicine, and memory. It is a sacred place where the sound of the water reminds us of the
