and 13 guests at a major concert. All Top Prizes were claimed, and the Grand Prize winner — a North Vancouver resident — donated four of the 13 suite spots to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. Tickets were sold at retailers across B.C.

Courtenay Benefits

In 2024, the City of Courtenay allocated its share of provincial gambling revenue from hosting Chances Courtenay to several local initiatives. Funding was provided to the Courtenay & District Historical Society, Sid Williams Theatre Society, and Comox Valley Art Gallery. The revenue also supported two RCMP positions, the LINC Youth Centre roof replacement project, the K'ómoks First Nation Guardian Watchmen Program, and the National Indigenous Peoples Day Celebration.

Did You Know?

The K'ómoks Guardian Watchmen Program conducts environmental monitoring and restoration within K'ómoks traditional territory. Activities include patrols to identify environmental concerns, eco-cultural restoration projects like wildlife surveys and fish counts. The program also participates in the Ha-ma-yas Stewardship Network, collaborating with neighbouring First Nations to enhance regional environmental

Coldest Night of the Year
