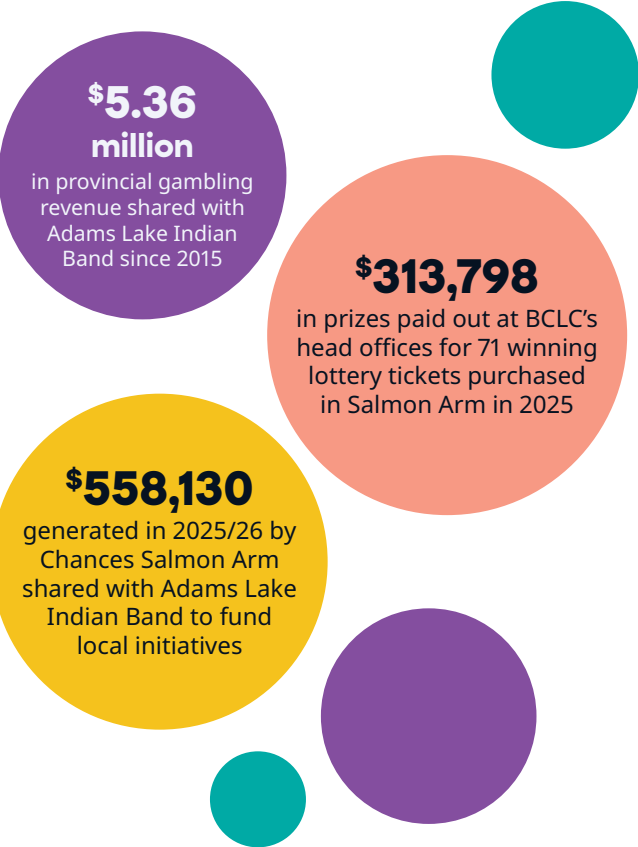

In fiscal year 2025/26, the Province of B.C. distributed \$95.2 million to First Nations in B.C. as part of the BC First Nations Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership. First Nations receive a seven percent entitlement of BCLC's net income through the BC First Nations Gaming Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Kel-c Jules

As part of BCLC's Commitment to Reconciliation, the cover artwork of this Community Impact Report was created by Kel-c Jules, a Secwépemc artist residing on the traditional, unceded lands of Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc.

Set within the landscape of Adams Lake and surrounding waterways, this illustration reflects the understanding that the land has always brought people together. Long before roads, these waterways were ancient highways, carrying knowledge, stories, trade, and relationships between communities. The four figures represent the strength found in coming together and how own experiences, perspectives, and gifts remind us that a healthy community is built through belonging, care, and shared responsibility. The sxúsem leaves frame the composition as symbols of growth, renewal, and the ways connection continues to grow when it is nurtured. Together, the people, the land, and the water speak to the importance of human connection and the role we all play in creating a community where everyone feels seen, valued, and that they belong.
