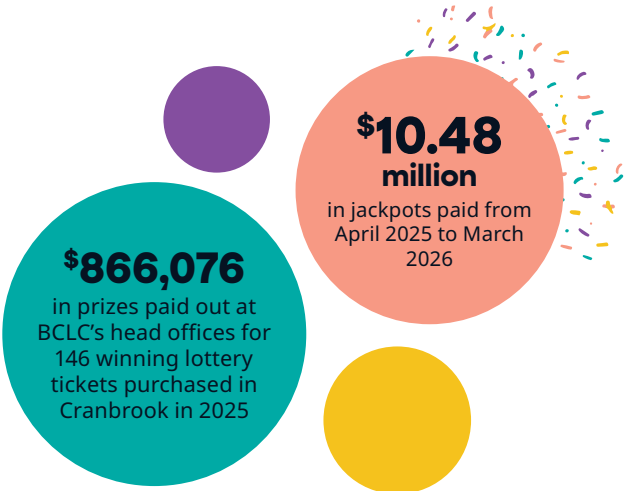

KTUNAXA NATION

Rich History

The Ktunaxa Nation is proud of their unique Indigenous culture, deep history in the region and long-standing connection to the land. Once a former residential school, the Mission Building was reclaimed under the visionary leadership of the Ktunaxa Nation and transformed into a full-service resort and beacon of light for the community. St. Eugene Resort's ownership consists of four Ktunaxa communities including the ʔAkisqnuq, ʔAqam, Yaqit ʔa-knuq ʔi ʔit (Tobacco Plains), Yaqan nukiy (Lower Kootenay) and the Kenpesq't (Shuswap Indian Band). Together they make up St. Eugene Mission Holdings Limited (SEM).

In fiscal year 2025/26, the Province of B.C. distributed \$95.2 million to First Nations in B.C. as part of the BC First Nations Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership. First Nations receive a seven percent entitlement of BCLC's net income through the BC First Nations Gaming Revenue Sharing Limited Partnership.

Local Impact

In 2025, St. Eugene Resort proudly supported a variety of local events and organizations through sponsorships and charitable donations. Beneficiaries included the Aqam 2025 Provincial Elders Gathering, Angel Flights, the Cranbrook Food Bank, and KOA Care Camp. St. Eugene also sponsored community initiatives and activities such as the Grand Parade during the Spirit of the Rockies Celebration, the Valley Alley Bowling League, and Cranbrook Bucks Hockey.
