Each year, municipal and First Nations governments in B.C. that host a gambling facility typically receive a 10 per cent share of net gambling income generated at those facilities. In fiscal year 2025/26, BCLC generated \$83.4 million for the Province to distribute to 33 Host Local Governments across B.C. to fund local projects and initiatives.

In addition to supporting community initiatives, Chances Signal Point also contributes to the local economy by sourcing supplies and services from a range of local vendors, including Delainy's Lock & Key, Cool Clear Water, and Margetts Meat Market.

Greater Good Giveaway

BCLC launched a new Scratch & Win ticket the "Greater Good Giveaway" which offers a Top Prize of \$10,000 for the winner and \$10,000 for their registered charity of choice, selected from a list of British Columbia charities on CanadaHelps. The ticket aligns strongly with our social purpose, to generate win-wins for the greater good, and we believe that when we share the wins, we are more connected to each other, our communities and our province.

Williams Lake Benefits

In 2025, the City of Williams Lake allocated its share of provincial gambling revenue to support a range of community organizations, infrastructure improvements, and cultural initiatives. Key investments included:

- \$160,000 to the Williams Lake and District Chamber of Commerce for operations at the Tourism Discovery Centre.
- \$42,000 to the Cariboo Chilcotin Conservation Society for its Water Wise Program, focused on community-based water education, and \$37,000 for its Waste Wise Program.
- \$30,000 to Scout Island Field Naturalists to support trail maintenance and \$20,000 to the Scout Island Nature Centre.
- \$24,000 to the Museum of the Cariboo Chilcotin Society to assist with operations.
- \$20,000 to Williams Lake Hospice Society, providing compassionate care for the dying and support for their families and friends.
- \$4,000 to the Downtown Williams Lake Business Improvement Association to host the Winter Lights Festival.
- Additional grants ranging from \$2,800 to \$15,000 were distributed to community groups including Big Brothers & Big Sisters, the Boys & Girls Club, Potato House Sustainable Community Society, and others.



LOCAL IMPACT

Community Support

In 2025, Chances Signal Point supported a wide range of local organizations through charitable donations, in-kind contributions, and sponsorships. Some of the charities that received funding support this year include Cariboo Chilcotin Metis Association, Cariboo Chilcotin Partners for Literacy Society, Williams Lake Aboriginal Infant Development Program, Cariboo Friendship Society, and Cariboo Brain Injury Association.
