## Background/email correspondence:

Through a Freedom of Information request, we have obtained reports written by senior investigators with the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch. These reports, completed in October of 2013 and 2014, were sent to senior GPEB management, as well as officials with the BC Lottery Corporation and the ADM for gaming enforcement.

The 2013 report shows senior GPEB investigators were deeply alarmed over the increase in suspicious currency transactions pouring through BC casinos. One section states that suspicious currency transactions were coming very close to \$100 million PER YEAR.

The 2014 report highlights concern over the "significant and rapid acceleration of suspicious cash coming into predominately lower mainland casinos" which "again indicate(s) that all money-laundering measures that have been put into place since 2008 have not slowed or decreased the flow of suspicious currency coming into our casinos." The "again" refers to a similar conclusion in the previous October 2013 report.

The 2014 report also projected that suspicious cash transactions in 2014 would total more than \$185 million. A check by CBC News of the actual year-end figure shows the GPEB projection was very accurate.

Approximately 4 weeks after the October 2014 report was forwarded to BCLC and others, the 2 main authors--GPEB's senior director of investigations Joe Schalk and executive director Larry Vander Graaf -- were dismissed.

#### Request:

#### Questions:

1) Joe Schalk says executives with BCLC wanted him to stop raising the alarm over money laundering. Schalk says he believes BCLC "was willfully blind" to what was happening. What is BCLC's response?

#### **BCLC** response:

These claims are categorically false. BCLC and its employees recognized the risk that money-laundering poses to casinos, took action and continue to take action to increase controls as new threats emerge.

BCLC is one of five organizations responsible for mitigating the money-laundering risk to B.C. casinos, along with the Financial Transactions and Reports Analysis Centre of Canada (FINTRAC), the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch (GPEB), Service Providers and police. BCLC's role and authority is to monitor for and report incidents of suspected illegal activity; the Corporation has no law enforcement or investigative powers.

BCLC reports all suspicious financial transactions to FINTRAC, GPEB and RCMP. BCLC also reports all conduct, activity or incident that involves the potential commission of an offence under the Criminal Code or Gaming Control Act to GPEB and law enforcement for potential investigation.

Beginning in 2012, BCLC identified concerns related to possible illegal activity in B.C. casinos and took action – including with increased customer due diligence efforts such as more in-depth interviews with customers where concerns around source of cash and source of wealth arose.

Our action continued into 2014 and 2015, when BCLC flagged its concerns to police and GPEB in numerous meetings. This includes a November 2014 meeting in which BCLC presented a proposal to the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit (CFSEU) for a targeted investigation of BCLC's list of individuals who appeared to be engaging in criminal activity in proximity to gaming facilities. It also includes a February 2015 meeting during which BCLC requested the RCMP's Federal Serious and Organized Crime (FSOC) consider initiating an investigation based on information BCLC had collected related to cash drops at casinos by an individual believed to be associated to organized crime. Shortly thereafter, RCMP advised BCLC of the start of its E-Pirate multinational money-laundering investigation.

In 2015 (and expanded on in 2018), BCLC implemented source of funds requirements for transactions of \$10,000 or more that include conducting background checks, including inquiries into the source and net worth of the customer, and requiring casino operators to collect and record specified information on customers' source of buy-in funds each transaction. In addition, the customer is required to affirm the accuracy of this information by signing a declaration in order to conduct the transaction. Where warranted, BCLC may place conditions on the customer's use of cash or ban a customer from conducting any transactions at casinos in B.C.

BCLC implemented the Reasonable Measures process in 2017 in alignment with new federal regulations and to monitor and control third-party transactions. Casino operators are required to ascertain and document the ownership of funds for all cash buy-ins and disbursements of \$10,000 or more within a 24-hour period.

Following BCLC's ongoing actions and commitment to improving its anti-money laundering controls, suspicious transactions in B.C. casinos reduced significantly since 2015, as outlined in the data previously provided to CBC and as demonstrated in the attached chart.

2) Joe Schalk says hard numbers and his projections show BC casinos handled approx. \$1 billion in suspicious cash transactions from 2010 to 2016. Our check of the figures provided through FOI's and compared to figures supplied by BCLC show the figure was at least somewhere between \$700 and \$800 million-- far in excess of the \$100 million-plus guessed by Peter German following his "Dirty Money" report. #### **BCLC** response:


BCLC can't speak to others' estimates as we are not privy to how those calculations were completed.

Our industry, regulators and law enforcement share the public's concern about money laundering in the province and we have taken, and continue to take, actions to mitigate the ever-evolving risks of criminal activity.

BCLC reports every suspicious transaction to FINTRAC and provides copies of those reports to police and GPEB for investigation of any money laundering or terrorist financing activities. In addition, where BCLC believes there are indicators of criminals targeting casinos, it will take additional steps to alert police and request investigation as it did with E-Pirate. Where police or GPEB conduct an investigation, BCLC will provide any support and take any actions requested of it by police or GPEB.

In concert with Casino Service Providers, regulators (GPEB and FINTRAC) and law enforcement, we remain steadfast in our commitment to ensuring that gambling facilities remain safe for players, employees and communities.

BCLC is actively working with the Province to address the recommendations in Dr. Peter German's review and, together, we have completed nine of the 48 recommendations from Dr. German's review.

ISSUE: Status update on efforts to address unregulated online gambling

#### SUMMARY:

 The Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch (GPEB), Legal Services Branch (LSB), and the British Columbia Lottery Corporation (BCLC) are continuing work to address unregulated online gambling, including:

- GPEB-BCLC Online Gambling Working Group: meeting monthly and undertaking analysis of options;
- Online gambling prevalence study: A final report measuring the prevalence of online gambling in BC will be complete in February. Analysis is underway to compare the findings with BCLC data;
- Complaint to Advertising Standards Canada (ASC): Regulators in BC, Alberta, Manitoba, and Nova Scotia have made a complaint to the ASC about the advertisement of unregulated gambling sites. s 13(1) the regulators to resubmit as separate complaints for each advertiser; and s 13(1)

# BACKGROUND:

- PlayNow.com, BCLC's online gambling platform, is BC's only commercial online gambling
  platform that operates within the legal framework created by the *Criminal Code* and BC's *Gaming Control Act* (GCA). All other commercial online gambling platforms operate outside
  the legal framework. This exposes BC patrons to risks such as fraud, changing odds, lack of
  responsible gambling features, and access by minors.
- The Attorney General (AG) has provided direction to GPEB and BCLC to form a working group to jointly explore options to address unregulated online gambling websites. s 14

# BCLC-GPEB Online Gambling Working Group

- GPEB and BCLC have formed a working group that meets monthly. The terms of reference
  have been signed off and the group's mandate is "to provide advice, information, and data,
  as well as to make recommendations jointly to address unregulated online gambling in BC."
- The working group is considering three main options (the options): s 13(1)
- In early 2018, BCLC contracted Ernst & Young (EY) to conduct an impact analysis of the options, s 13(1)
   BCLC and GPEB are undertaking further analysis to refine assumptions and the likelihood of success of each option.
- Essential to the analysis of each option is the legal feasibility under the Criminal Code. s 13(1), s 14

#### Online Gambling Prevalence Survey

- GPEB and BC Stats contracted RA Malatest and Associates to conduct a population survey
  of the prevalence of online gambling among British Columbians. The intent of the survey is to
  seek data to inform the analysis of options. The survey asked respondents about their online
  gambling participation and play frequency on PlayNow.com as well as unregulated sites.
- Malatest will provide a final report and presentation to GPEB on February 6, 2019.
- GPEB and BCLC are jointly reviewing the draft report s 13(1)
- GPEB's Responsible and Problem Gambling team and BCLC's Player Health team are also jointly conducting an additional study to understand problem gambling prevalence among online gamblers. s 13(1)

Completion of this study also fulfills a commitment from the Plan for Public Health and Gambling.

## Provincial Regulators' Complaint to Advertising Standards Canada (ASC)

- The widespread advertising of unregulated gambling websites on television, radio and the internet creates the illusion that these sites are offering services that are safe and secure for BC residents.
- GPEB led other provincial regulators in sending an official complaint to the ASC in December 2018. The signatories included the heads of GPEB; Alberta Gaming, Liquor & Cannabis; Liquor, Gaming and Cannabis Authority of Manitoba; and The Alcohol, Gaming, Fuel and Tobacco Division of Service Nova Scotia.
- The complaint outlined instances in which unregulated online gambling platforms had violated the Canadian Code of Advertising Standards. It requested that the ASC instruct unregulated online gambling providers to withdraw their ads and provide notification that similar advertising is not permitted by Canadian media.
- ASC's Vice President, Standards, responded with a request to revise the complaint and
  resubmit as four separate complaints one for each advertiser and their alleged violations.
  This will allow ASC to forward complaints directly to the advertisers for their response. In the
  initial response, the ASC has advised that complaints about advertising to 18-year-olds in
  provinces where the minimum gambling age is 19 have the most merit.

Thank you for your October 10, 2018, letter regarding recommendations for the development and implementation of VIP Operational Standards, Policies & Procedures. I appreciate your commitment for BCLC to immediately undertake the work necessary to draft policies and procedures that will govern service provider interactions with VIP customers.

In response to your request for clarification of the definition of VIP rooms and based on the findings and conclusions of the GPEB Final Investigation Report on Casino VIP Operations, the focus for policy development should be the private VIP rooms in facilities.

I have considered your comments related to expanding the requirement for corporate rather than personnel registration for all service provider employees who have a role in VIP operations. At this time, GPEB will continue with the requirement for one VIP room guest services director (or equivalent) for each of the five lower mainland casinos while continuing to assess the need to expand the registration as you have suggested.

In relation to your suggestion that all senior hosting staff report directly to the general manager of a facility, I've asked the Director of Corporate Registration to have further discussions with your staff to understand the potential benefits of such a requirement and GPEB's authority to do so.

We look forward to working closely with your BCLC team to ensure that effective controls are implemented for service provider interactions with VIP players understanding that any BCLC policy must not contravene labour or tax laws or have BCLC standing in place of the service provider as the employer.

As you are aware, the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch (GPEB) is responsible for the overall integrity of gambling in the province. Under section 34(1)(f)(i) of the Gaming Control Regulation, it is a condition of registration for gaming service providers to obey the standard operating procedures (BCLC Standards) and rules of play set out by the British Columbia Lottery Corporation (BCLC).

GPEB considers the Source of Funds Policy BCLC, implemented in January 2018 and incorporated into the Standards in September 2018, an integral control in anti-money laundering efforts, and service provider compliance with this policy is critical for upholding the integrity of gambling in BC.

GPEB conducted an audit of transactions from May to June 2018 and a follow up audit of transactions in August 2018 at the five largest Lower Mainland casinos to verify compliance to BCLC's Source of Funds Policy. Our audit found non-compliance with this policy, specifically around incomplete or missing documentation required to substantiate the source of the patron's funds. In addition, preliminary results from the work being performed by Deloitte have identified continued non-compliance with Source of Funds Policy.

As a result of these findings, I sent letters on November 28, 2018 to the three largest casino service providers in the Lower Mainland outlining GPEB's expectations of their compliance with BCLC's Source of Funds Policy. These letters outlined that continued non-compliance will result in escalating administrative sanctions, which could include additional conditions being imposed on their registration, fines, suspensions and/or cancellation of registration.

GPEB's audits also found service provider confusion during the roll-out of the Source of Funds Policy. The policy has been in effect for 11 months and formally incorporated into BCLC Standards for two months, yet non-compliance remains at unacceptable levels. As BCLC is responsible for the conduct and management of gambling in the province, including the implementation of this policy, GPEB requests that BCLC support service providers in their efforts to achieve and maintain full compliance. This may include analysis to determine the reasons behind non-compliance and additional training and increased onsite support from BCLC as necessary.

GPEB expects service providers to be in full compliance as required under section 34(1)(f)(i) of the Gaming Control Regulation. GPEB will be conducting another source of funds audit in early 2019 to review BCLC's program and to verify service provider compliance with the policy.

GPEB is committed to ensuring the integrity of gambling in BC and supporting BCLC in its antimoney laundering efforts.

We appreciate your feedback and will continue keeping the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch (GPEB) appraised of any further actions or developments related to this policy.

As per your recommendation, we will be sharing this information with the Anti-Money Laundering (AML) Deputy Minister's Committee prior to implementation. As per BCLC's usual practice for procedural changes, we will provide detailed notice and implementation instructions to service providers on this change as well as in-person training and support as needed. BCLC will take this opportunity to remind service providers of their obligations in regard to the identification and reporting of all suspicious transactions.

GPEB Policy Framework for Novelty Betting in British Columbia

#### Context

The Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch (GEPB) has updated and reissued this policy framework for novelty bets offered by the British Columbia Lottery Corporation (BCLC). This policy framework covers novelty bet types currently known and permitted by law.

## **Objectives**

- To ensure the integrity of gaming in British Columbia.
- To clarify the standards that apply to novelty betting in British Columbia.

# Authority and Application

Section 27(2)(d) of the *Gaming Control Act* authorizes the General Manager of GPEB to establish public interest standards for the gambling industry. The following public interest standards apply to BCLC and all other gaming services providers.

## **Definition**

- Novelty bets are wagers on events/markets which will result in the future and whose outcomes are determined by occurrences independent of BCLC.
- Novelty bets will not be based on the outcome of, or contingencies occurring within, a
  sporting event, race, fight, or athletic contest (e.g. final scores, half-time scores, placement of
  contestants, etc.).

# Applicable Laws, Policies and Public Interest Standards

BCLC must ensure novelty betting activities are conducted in compliance with the applicable laws, policies and public interest standards, including:

- · Criminal Code of Canada
- Gaming Control Act
- · Gaming Control Regulation
- TGS5 Technical Gambling Standards for Internet Gambling Systems (IGSs) Technical Standards Document (TSD)
- Responsible Gambling Standards for the BC Gambling Industry
- Advertising and Marketing Standards for Gambling in British Columbia
- · Relevant privacy legislation.
